RSE Aims and Objectives

In St. Aidan's Community College we aims

- o To help our students to understand and develop friendships and relationships
- o We also aim to promote an understanding of sexuality

Objectives

- To understand sexual development and identity and explore aspects of sexuality including sex role stereotyping, gender issues and cultural influences on sexuality and to value family life and appreciate the responsibilities of parenthood

Topics in this section include: an awareness of what constitutes a loving relationship. the long-term commitment involved in marriage. parenting and family life. After this we will move onto the topic of divorce. We will observe factors that led to a divorce such as financial difficulties, abuse in the relationship, infidelity and possible drug or alcohol abuse. In conclusion to the lesson, we read case studies on couples getting a divorce and highlighted possible factors that led to that divorce.

In addition to this we will examine the reproductive technologies that are available out there today. We will examine what each implements and what each holds for the family involved. Also we will examine the morality of each and the Church's stance on the issue. We will look at the history of reproductive technologies in Ireland and read and watch relevant clips from newspapers and YouTube to reinforce the teaching.

In concluding this section, we will shift focus to the ongoing genetics debate and human growth and development. We will examine the history of the genetics and the role it has to play in society. We will examine the controversy surrounding the debate and the implications it holds for those people involved. We will also learn about

- a deeper understanding of pregnancy and the developing foetus.

Teaching Approaches

Teachers of Religious Education will set aside a minimum of six classes a year to Relationships and Sexual Education. During these classes teacher will aim to cover a wide range of topics that is outlined in the Relationships and Sexual Education Syllabus. Teachers will use a wide range of suggested approaches. Where teachers choose to use an approach with which they are unfamiliar, time, practice and patience with themselves will be rewarded in terms of the skill development of the teacher and the student's movement towards achieving the objective of the lesson.
