

The History Department of St. Aidan's, in a move to promote and encourage the enjoyment of the subject, have refurbished the History room with a new multimedia system and a video and DVD library. As part of their Transition Year English class, the students of Class Sinead conducted a survey into peoples' attitudes to television and their viewing habits. The results were interesting and many of the conclusions were surprising. Despite a number of complaints about particular programming, 90% of people surveyed believed that television was, overall, a force for good. 80% believed that television had more influence on young people than churches, while 45% believed that it had a greater




influence than schools on young people. The least favoured type of television programme was, surprisingly, the soap opera. Eastenders especially seems to generate quite a strong negative response. The most popular type of programme was comedy, with The Simpsons the firm favourite. R.T.E.'s programming for people under 18 scored a mediocre 50% and although Irish programmes like Podge and Rodge scored the occasional vote, few homemade programmes featured in the survey. Young Scientists Exhibition.

Three Transition Year students, Micheal O'Callaghan, Martin Dunne and John Foley, had a project accepted for the Young Scientists Exhibition in the R.D.S. in Dublin during the first week in January and so became the first students from St. Aidan's to exhibit at this prestigious event. Their research project, called The Effect of Rhythm on the Rate of Running, showed how the beat of music can influence the speed of a person's activity in such a way that one will run slower while listening to music with

a slow beat. The students travelled to Dublin under the guidance of Mr. John Doyle and spent four highly enjoyable days staying in the Grand Canal Hotel. They quickly learned two important lessons; firstly, that Science can be hard work, secondly, and more importantly, that Science can be great fun. The students spent three days at the exhibition during which their project was on show to the public. Every evening they spent time at the various entertainment events provided, winning memory sticks as well as hearts! A good time was had by all.



UCC Access Programme

When I was a young boy I lived near the university. I sometimes took my dog for a walk through the college grounds. I kept a close eye on the gardeners because I sensed I was in a place not meant for me and feared they would tell me to get out. My parents had left school early and university was a place for other peoples' children. I eventually made it, of course, but maybe I was plain lucky and times were less competitive then. I often think that the Access Programme, had it existed, would

have been of benefit to my pals who didn't make it. But it does exist now and it may benefit you.

So what is the Access Programme? Universities such as U.C.C. are linked with our school and offer opportunities to our students, across all year groups, to attend seminars, short induction courses, sponsored competitions and summer camps, all with a view to demystifying what college life is about. Those who have attended these events this year have enjoyed the experience and are now in a better position to know the possibilities and to realise their



ambitions. For those in Leaving Cert, who have applied for and have been accepted into the Access Programme - means testing is just one of the criteria - a golden opportunity exists. If they win a place in U.C.C. through the points system extra supports such as mentoring and funding will be available. If they miss a place by a few points a quota system will apply and they may yet be offered the course. However, the Access Programme does not offer courses "on the cheap", and proven hard work is still a benchmark. But for those who benefit from the Programme a life changing and life enhancing opportunity beckons. Let the games begin!

TRIZ

Problem solving skills, innovation, creativity, these are, undoubtedly, the skills that the leaders of the future will need. With this in mind, last October, St. Aidan's invited Professor John Mc Sweeney from UCC to give a series of workshops to our Transition Year Students as part of the TRIZ programme. TRIZ is an approach developed by Russian scientists to foster problem solving skills. As part of the course a number of our Transition

Year students set up a company called *Inventriz* and undertook a project, entitled *The Ball Wall*, which involved considerable ingenuity, market research and design. In April this project won second prize in the Annual UCC TRIZ Awards Ceremony. Amsterdam Tour

In February a group of 62 First and Second Year students and staff visited Amsterdam. St. Aidan's Staff member Ms.Renske Hickey was born in Holland and grew up there. Here she describes the Dutch second level education system.

School starts early in the morning in Holland. Between 7 and 8am you can see millions of teenagers on their bicycles. There are 15 million people living in Holland, which is the size of Munster. Although the country is flat and ideal for cycling the weather conditions are not always that favourable-Holland gets as much precipitation as Ireland. There are no school uniforms so there's an array of colours in every school. Education, like in Ireland, is supposed to be free, but books, excursions and fees have to be paid. Additionally, an annual fee of approximately €1000 must be paid for those students who are over sixteen. In 6th class of primary school a decision is made on what school would be the best for each individual student. There are three different types of secondary schools; VMBOs, which prepare students for apprenticeships and certificate courses, HAVOs, which prepare students for I.T. courses, nursing, teacher training, police etc. and Athenaeums which prepare students for all university courses. To make it easier to change schools most colleges offer all three types of education within the one school. They are called scholen gemeenschap (school communities). These are very large schools, often with around twenty 1st year classes. You're not allowed to leave school before your 16th birthday. School holidays aren't as plentiful as in Ireland with a maximum of 60 days of holidays in the year. Unfortunately, if you don't pass your summer exams you have to repeat the whole year!



Skiing Trip to Germany

On the 30th of January 38 students, accompanied by teachers Mr. Cremin, Mr. Savage, Ms. Scanlon and Ms. Guile, met at Cork airport, all eagerly anticipating the long awaited skiing trip to Germany. The plane journey took over two hours. After arriving in Munich we took a walk around the city to visit the tourist attractions. By the time we arrived at the hotel we were all tired so we went straight to bed. We got up



around 7.30 every morning, and headed to the slopes at 9.00. After a few days all of us could ski, so we all had a good laugh. Skiing finished at 4.00 everyday. The night activities included swimming, bowling, playing pool and even a disco. We had to be back in our rooms by 10.00 but no one complained because we were all wrecked anyway. At the end of the week 1 don't think anyone wanted to leave. The trip had been a great experience for everyone, one we will never forget.
