Aidan's for U.S. World Scholar Athletic Games

St. Aidan's Community College will be the first Cork school to represent Ireland in the World Scholar Athlete Games which will be held in the U.S. this summer. The concept of the Games is based upon the Olympic ideal. The Olympics grew out of the belief that sport can be a force for understanding and friendship among athletes and among nations.

At the World Scholar-Athlete Games there are no national teams, thus, a boy's basketball team might be made up of 12 young men from 12 different countries whilst the Scholar-Athlete Games Choir may be comprised of students from 16 different countries. This is a highly prestigious event for which over ten thousand scholar athletes have applied. Luckily, four teachers and twenty five highly skilled athletes, musicians and scholars from St. Aidan's will fly to the U.S. this coming June to attend the games in the University of Connecticut.

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Past Pupil Voted Kansas Professor of the Year

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education in the USA have named Dr. Ellyn Mulcahy, Associate Professor Of Science, Johnson County Community College, the 2010 Kansas Professor of the Year.

Ellyn, a past pupil of St. Aidan's, was selected from more than 300 top professors in the United States. She graduated from St. Aidans in 1992 and progressed to University College Cork where she received her bachelor of science honours degree in microbiology. She received her doctorate in microbiology from Creighton University, Omaha.

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College Welcomes 130 First Years

The transfer from primary to secondary school is a most important stage in the life of any child. At transfer children are faced with a new situation, when they have to leave behind the comfortable familiarity of the primary school and enter the secondary school where an entirely new set of circumstances awaits them. Transition involves changes. It usually means parting with some friends and making new friends, a greater number of teachers, new subjects, more homework, movement to different classrooms, having a longer day, from being seniors in the primary school to being the most junior members in the secondary school. Pupils experience anxieties around transfer. However, such feelings are generally accompanied by feelings of anticipation. Most of their anxieties dissipate as new routines and relationships are established. The majority of pupils settle into secondary school fairly quickly.

Pupils should be helped to make the transition as smoothly as possible. Many schools have developed induction programmes to facilitate pupils' adjustment to their new environment on their arrival at secondary school.

When the new first years arrive at St. Aidan's they are welcomed by the Principal, Mr. Ahern and the First Year Tutor, Fr. Shem, osa. Each class has a teacher (Class Tutor) who will take care of the class. The role of the Class Tutor is to help the new pupils to settle in, reassure them, provide a sense of belonging and security, help the pupils with the demands of the new school, monitor their adjustment and progress and is a contact person for parents / guardians.

The pupils spend the first two mornings with their Class Tutor who conducts the induction programme. Some of the activities include: a general introduction to the school, helping the pupils to get to know one another, explanation of the timetable and various practical and organisational issues which help the pupils to settle in and prepare for day to day life in St. Aidan's.

Parents / guardians have a very important role to play in assisting their children to successfully transfer. Their encouragement, support and involvement are significant factors in the experience of pupils who make a successful transition to secondary school.

A meeting for the parents / guardians of the first year pupils takes place in late September. Additionally, parents have the opportunity to meet their child's Class Tutor at the parent-tutor meeting, which takes place in November to discuss how their child has settled in.

We welcome all our new pupils and we wish them every success and happiness in St. Aidan's Community College. To each and all we say, in the words of our College motto, "Let your light shine" – "Bíodh bhur solas ag taitneamh"

Study Skills: Getting Organised

Your goal to achieve certain grades, to get into a certain course, to enter your chosen career won't happen just because you want it to. You must now give concrete expression to that 'want' by deciding on a study plan that suits you.

The purpose of a study plan is not to increase your workload but rather to make you work more efficiently and effectively so that you get a lot done in a concentrated period of time.

You owe this to yourself to make sure that the efforts you are making now in class and homework pay off. Here are some tips to help you with your study plan:

➤ Draw up a list of topics/chapters/pages/ questions you would like to cover (over and above the homework requirements) for the coming week. Sunday night is usually a good time to plan the week ahead. Avoid vague statements like "study history"; be specific about what you want to know and understand about the topic and write down the question you want answered/the chapter you want to study.

- Remember your list must involve material over-and-above any and all homework.
- Give each subject a set amount of time.
- Break each time-set for each subject/topic into 20/30/40 minute sessions.
- Prioritise your list by numbering the topics.
- Cross out or tick off each item from your list as you complete it.
- Don't be tempted into always studying your favourite subjects first. Get the difficult ones out of the way first and vary the order of what subject you study and when you study it.
- If you do not get a study topic complete or even started write it in for the next study session.
- Get into the habit of always making a list of what you want to study on a daily and a weekly basis and tick it off when you complete it.

At Leaving Cert level you would be well advised to give your schoolwork and study at least 3 and a half hours after school each week-day and more at weekends.

All Higher Level candidates will require more. Don't study right up to bedtime. Give yourself 30 minutes or more to wind down.Good luck with your efforts.

She has contributed to the development of JCCC's biotechnology program and has also developed curricula for several new classes. In continuing education, Ellyn developed and implemented classes for health care professionals on the topics of antibiotic resistance, bioterrorism, cultural competency, epidemiology and infectious disease.

She has continued her studies on ways to educate nonliterate female Somali refugees about maternal health and relevant chronic diseases and has published numerous publications. 
Careers Exhibition, Rochestown Park Hotel
