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All-Ireland U19 Basketball Champions

St Aidan's Community College captured the U19 All Ireland title in sensational fashion defeating Portmarnock Community School on the buzzer. It was the final 2 minutes of the game when St Aidan's displayed their absolute determination to be crowned All-Ireland champions.

This victory came about as a result of a twelve match unbeaten run stretching back to October and superb displays from the team, Jessica Lane, Marie Canning, Amy Connolly, Kaitlyn Long, Aisling Connolly, Leanne O' Sullivan, Jodie Forde, Aisling O'Connor and Eiblhlis Murphy.

Eibhlis Murphy was awarded most valuable player for her outstanding play on both ends of the court with trojan work in defence, contributing 15 points to the St Aidan's tally. This was St Aidan's first ever win in an All-Ireland final. The team coaches Ms Marion

It's an honour and a pleasure to be guest speaker at tonight's Awards Ceremony here in St. Aidan's. I have fond memories of this school and coming back on a happy occasion like tonight is something I am delighted to do.

Congratulations to those of you who received awards this evening. It's always nice to be recognised for your hard work and perseverance and a lot of credit goes to you and your families for being here on a night as special as this.

It seems like only yesterday I was sitting where you are now, a few weeks away from my Leaving Cert wondering what the future would hold. When I graduated from here in the year 2000, the internet was something you had to dial into, most people didn't have a mobile phone, never mind a smartphone and a tablet was something you took for a headache! I was spending my days studying and playing music whenever I could get away with it! However, it was a time for decisions about life, where I wanted to go, what I wanted to be.

My advice to you is to find and follow what you love doing. I was lucky enough in my years here to experience and try lots of different things. I appeared in a school musical in my first year which sparked an interest in drama which followed me right through my college years. I played music in many a school concert and even got a chance to produce my first CD as a sixth year student for the School's Millenium Concert. In the end an interest in Maths and Physics, nurtured inside these walls, led me on the path to my chosen career as an Engineer. Families want to have control over their own lives and the decisions affecting them. 

In St. Aidan's we consciously strive to give our students the opportunity to get involved in issues of social justice and this year's representatives on the SHARE Student Executive were fifth year students Claire O'Connell and Gerard Donnelly.

I can honestly say that my involvement with SHARE has been life changing. I got a lot of benefit from being part of the Executive, especially on my weekly visitations to my S.H.A.R.E resident. I really enjoyed this as it gave me the chance to meet new people and form a really close relationship with them. I consider myself very lucky with my resident as we grew really close and I will continue to stay in contact with him long after S.H.A.R.E finishes this year. Our busiest time of the year was at Christmas, when we collected for hours on end in our "stylish" yellow jackets, in the freezing cold on the streets of Cork. It was challenging at times but well worth it.

Students at St. Aidan's Community College are saying goodbye to their textbooks and writing their own.

The school's History department is trialling the use of cloud and mobile information technology to develop students' research skills.

"Serious historians are rarely content with second-hand descriptions when primary sources are available and the internet provides a staggering amount of material. We can't afford to give everyone an iPad, so we have a Bring Your Own Device policy, and students share with their classmates," says Head of History, Colm Manley. "We use tablets, laptops and smart-phones, whatever is available. So far, laptops with their large screens seem to be perfect for group work, but many tablets have proven to be the ideal choice for students doing independent research. At the very least it promotes a positive use of devices that seem to get such negative press at other times. Hardware is always going to be an issue, not least because of the expense. It's a costly investment for parents, so the more use we make of these devices for the students' benefit the better."

And the textbooks? "Ideally students will start writing them, based on their own knowledge acquired first hand through research. It's hoped to extend the project to some of the Junior cycle classes." All Leaving Cert History students are



expected to write their own research study and examine documents from case studies. The rest of the course is generally taught through textbooks. However this method, which incorporates the idea of Self Organised Learning Environments, means that the information comes to students first-hand, in a form which is not easily forgotten.

"The students have given a lot of input into how this learning can be made better. It's not just a matter of searching the internet - we use cloud storage so the teacher can mediate the material for the students and make it available to everyone even when they go offline." Sixth year students have so far responded favourably to the approach. "At the start I hated any research and found it frustrating, but I'm okay with it now," commented Shannon Madden. "It encourages independent thinking," says Richard O'Keefe. "It's certainly a more efficient method," added Zoe O'Connell. Fifth year students also chose to abandon the textbook in favour of the digital system. -*Mr C. Manley*

We spent our time on different aspects of Maths and problem solving, both individually and in pairs or groups. The tutors also demonstrated different methodologies in approaching the final answers. During the year we took part in table quizzes and last April we competed in "The Purple Comet", an International Mathematics competition.

We found the experience of attending these classes very enlightening and the experience of working with the tutors and with students from other schools around Cork was fantastic. We all hope to return in the new term to continue with these enrichment classes.

Renske was instrumental in my achievements, especially my Junior and Leaving Certificate exams. She taught me things that I could never read in a book. She showed me the beauty of life and nature and how art could be seen beyond just a picture, with its motifs and symbolism.

Renske's work as an SNA was not just her job, it was her vocation. She was diligent, dedicated and always went above and beyond the call of duty. She was a huge asset to St Aidan's, with her easy going manner and her many talents, natural flair and boundless energy. Nothing was too much trouble and her enthusiasm was infectious. Renske was so unassuming and endeared herself to everyone she met.
